If I am not sure if a dog is a service animal, what can I do? First, recognize that not all disabilities are apparent to others, so the dog may be a service animal for a disability that you do not recognize. Persons with authority over a place of public accommodation (e.g., a building manager or faculty member over a classroom) may ask only <u>two questions</u>: (1) Is the dog required because of a disability, and (2) What work or task has the dog been trained to perform? If the answer to either question is no, the animal may be excluded from public accommodation. You are not permitted to ask the handler to have the dog demonstrate the task.

What else should I know about service animals? To ensure equal access and nondiscrimination for individuals with disabilities who are using a service animal, the University encourages the following best practices:

- Allow service animals to accompany persons with disabilities on campus
- ask for medical documentation
