CourseCatalogDescription: Introduction to the historical development of -pmedern cultures in East, South, Southeast and Central Asia.

Course Description This course is an introductory, comparative survey of the societies and cultures of premodern Asia from prehistory through roughly 1500. Given the fact that there is no meaningful Asia, which is a Eurocentric notion, this course will focus on East Asia since there is a reasonably coherent "East Asian civilization." The course combines lectures and discussions. Lectures are devoted to the major themes and developments in prenodern Asian history, including Confiacism, Daoism, Buddhism, state building, diplomatic relations, trade connections and tributary system, gender relations, and social and cultural changes, etc. Discussions will allow us to examine a variety of primary sources—such as poems, stories, dia;itegal codes, philosophical and religious writings, visual images, and official communications, etc.—to deepen our understanding of the issues covered in the lectures.
